GOSPEL REFLECTION



It is said that when St Francis de Sales was asked which three virtues he especially recommended people to practise, he took a piece of paper and wrote the word 'humility' on it three times. Humility does not mean being timid or lacking initiative, still less does it mean flattering other people. It means being aware that we have nothing good except what God has given us, and that without Him we would fall into the worst sins. The humble man, when he sees another person sin, does not think 'how bad he is!', but 'how much worse I would be, left to myself'.

There is nothing exaggerated or unreal about humility. The humble man keeps habitually in his mind two things which are true: that other people have good qualities, and that he himself has no good of himself without God. He can

therefore in all truth rank himself below others, even if he may have to exercise some authority over them.

But why is it important to act like this? It is because humility is a magnet that attracts God to a soul. Only the humble soul can cooperate with God, because only such a soul can give glory to God, which is the very purpose and goal of creation. Christ's words teach us a law that is as unchangeable as God Himself: everyone who humbles himself will be exalted, but he who exalts himself will be humbled.

Celebrating the Christian Mystery

A new series drawing on themes from the Catechism of the Catholic Church (ccc).

At the Last Supper the Lord himself directed his disciples' attention toward the fulfilment of the Passover in the kingdom of God: 'I tell you I shall not drink again of this fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom.' Whenever the Church celebrates the Eucharist she remembers this promise and turns her gaze 'to him who is to come'. In her prayer she calls for his coming: Marana tha! 'Come, Lord Jesus!' May your grace come and this world pass away!' CCC 1403

Faith and Reason

WONDER & HUMILITY

John Paul II sets the words wonder and humility side by side to indicate man's attitude towards the grandeur and vastness of reality. Man is meant to be curious about the world around him. The temptation to view himself as distinct from the world is always in man, because in a sense, he is distinct. Yet man is of the earth, the earth is not of man. Humility leads him to understand that the job of science is to discover, not to create. In this way, we avoid idolising our own ideas of 'God', our graven images that attempt with futility to contain Him. The object of science — its subject matter — is the physical world, something that is already out there, including man himself. Man needs to regain the confidence to know what is, and to regain the humility to know that what he knows is not of his own making.
