### **GOSPEL REFLECTION**



When Abraham was climbing the mountain with his son Isaac to offer sacrifice, Isaac said to him: 'Father, I see the fire and the wood; but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?' And Abraham answered his son, in words full of deep and hidden meaning, 'God will provide himself the lamb for a burnt offering, my son.'

The Jews, the descendants of Isaac's own son, never forgot those words. Every morning and evening in the temple they offered up a lamb in sacrifice. This was a sign of their faith that God would one day provide a Lamb as a perfect offering, to re-open the gates of heaven, closed by Adam's sin.

Today St John the Baptist, standing by the river's bank, calls out 'Behold, the Lamb of God!' Probably he stretched out his hand to Jesus Christ, to show that in Him, the expectation of the Jews was fulfilled. Innocent and gentle, our

Lord sacrificed Himself for the people, to reconcile man with God.

In each holy Mass, the priest lifts up his hand and repeats the words of the Baptist: 'Behold, the Lamb of God'. He shows us what looks like bread but which we know by faith to be the true body of Christ. The sacrifice that our Lord offered on the Cross is brought close to us by the Mass. Spiritual sons of Abraham, we see the Lamb once slain who lives for ever.

### Celebrating the Christian Mystery

There is no surer pledge or dearer sign of this great hope in the new heavens and new earth "in which righteousness dwells," than the Eucharist. Every time this mystery is celebrated, "the work of our redemption is carried on" and we "break the one bread that provides the medicine of immortality, the antidote for death, and the food that makes us live forever in Jesus Christ." Jesus said: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; if any one eats of this bread, he will live for ever; . . . he who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life and . . . abides in me, and I in him" (Jn 6:51, 54, 56). ## Monsignor Bruce Harbert - Thoughts on today's Mass

Christians speak of the Mass as 'the mysteries', because we do not fully understand them. In them, we remember the death of Jesus. But there is more to it, as the Prayer over the Offerings says: whenever the memorial of this sacrifice is celebrated, the work of our redemption is [being] accomplished. So we go to Mass not only to remember, but to be changed, to belong more to God and less to ourselves. No wonder, then, that we pray that we may participate worthily in these mysteries. This prayer, like many in the Mass, is over 1400 years old. It became important in the 16th century when Protestants were claiming that the Mass is merely a memorial of Christ's Passion. Catholics were able to reply by opening their Missals and showing that, a whole thousand years earlier, Christians knew that there was more to Mass than that.
